Regarding these concerns, Frontera would like to share with the Business and Human Rights Centre the following statements:

1. As a Canadian company operating in Colombia, we are committed to comply with national and international legislation, ensuring a responsible business conduct that places the name of our home country in high regard. We act as a responsible corporate citizen, including protecting and promoting the human rights of land defenders. Frontera Energy is a member of the Global Compact, the Voluntary Principles on Security and Human Rights and the Mining and Energy Committee on Security and Human Rights, among others. Our practices are in line with the implementation of the Sustainability Policy and Human Rights Declaration based on the Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights. We recognize social protest as a legitimate means of expression, and that local communities, its leaders and authorities are indispensable for democracy and for the construction of a long-lasting and stable peace.
2. Regarding the Casanare case referred in this report, we reaffirm our statement shared on February 25, 2020 in the Business and Human Rights website, in which we explained in detail the events and how the Company managed the situation.
3. In line with the general reference made to alleged complaints by the community in Meta against Frontera, we do not have any evidence of these allegations. On the contrary, since inception in July of 2017, Frontera Energy has focused its efforts in community outreach to build trust with local communities. Listening and learning from local players is a critical part of our stakeholder engagement process. To date, we have undertaken community surveys and perceptions studies whose results had demonstrated more than 60% of favorability with Frontera. Moreover, during 2020 we have had no major incidents related to local communities.
4. At Frontera we are committed to the respect and promotion of human rights throughout our operation, regarding this we are constantly analysing risks and implementing action plan where needed. We are committed to strictly comply with the national legislation in the countries where we operate, and we are open and transparent to answer inquiries from our stakeholders.

As a company fully committed to promoting the human rights in its operations, and open to working jointly with civil society to achieve this, consider that these types of unfounded allegations in public reports do not do justice to our regional corporate efforts, which seek to develop successful outreach community programs.
