
Dear Ms Maeda,

Thank you for your email of the 28th September, addressed to Iván Vicioso and Paul Fernyhough, inviting Repsol to publicly share its response to a petition before the Commission of Human Rights of the Philippines. The text below in inverted commas is our response:

"Regarding the petition before the Commission on Human Rights of the Republic of the Philippines related to human rights impacts resulting from climate change, we hereby inform that we have responded to the Commission's request; however we are not able to disclose our response due to the confidentiality rules of the aforementioned Commission.
