

## Goldcorp's investment in Guatemala

This does not include:

- Salaries paid to almost 2,000 employees of which over 90% are local.
- Income tax collected by the government of Guatemala

It does not quantify the **sustainable development** impacts such as:

- The 82% increase in school enrolment
- The 3,000 students in 22 communities who previously were not attending school who now have access to education
- The 5,000 students in over 50 communities benefiting from teacher training programs
- The 78 local coffee producers realising a 9% increase in the selling price of their coffee due to improved skills and the ability to achieve organic certification
- The over 350 hectares of reforested land

This does not include the **sustainable** impacts of Goldcorp's support to critical human rights and governance initiatives such as:

- Mining law reform including taxes and royalties
- The Mesa de Dialogo (Roundtable Discussions) ensuring the voices of the community are included in meaningful consultation with government and industry
- Adoption of the Extractive Industry Transparency Initiative (EITI)
- Implementation of the ILO 169

The potential for environmental harm raised by the Tufts report is speculative and without foundation. No certified sampling to date has indicated any basis for increased probability of future issues. It is unreasonable for Tufts to summarily dismiss the extensive environmental measures of Goldcorp and the monitoring of the independent community environmental group AMAC.
